The Holy Family: Abraham; Model of Faith.

Faith is our most precious possession, because it enables us to have a relationship with God, and that is what we were created for. It is through a deep, ongoing, personal relationship with God that our lives become full of meaning for ourselves and those around us. That is what happened with Abraham. God asked him to do two things that were difficult for him, as we read about in the First and Second Readings for today. First, He asked him to take his wife and belongings, leave his homeland and become a nomad, to "go to a land I will show you." God didn't give him a detailed plan, no GPS system or Google maps. Instead, God gave him a chance to exercise and therefore grow in faith, to enter into a personal relationship with Him, a relationship built on trust. Then, after miraculously giving Abraham and Sarah a child in their old age, He again asked Abraham to do something that he didn't completely understand. He asked him to offer that child as a sacrifice. And Abraham was willing to do so, because he believed in God; he knew that God never asks things that are unwise or evil. And of course, we know from the Book of Genesis that God did not require Abraham to sacrifice his son – human sacrifice was a practice promoted by false religions, not by the one, true God. Abraham put his faith in God, and as a result he became wise, good and fulfilled and, God was able to do wonderful things in and through his life. The source of Abraham's greatness, his true wealth, was his faith, that relationship of trust and confidence with God. "Suppose you saw a starving man inhaling great deep breaths, filling his cheeks with wind to relieve his hunger; would you not call him mad? And it is just as mad to think that blowing yourself up with earthly goods can satisfy your hunger for meaning and happiness." (St Bernard of Clairvaux).
